19 Therefore thus saith the LORD, If thou return, then will I bring thee again, and thou shalt stand before me: and if thou take forth the precious from the vile, thou shalt be as my mouth: let them return unto thee; but return not thou unto them, 20 And I will make thee unto this people a fenced brasen wall: and they shall fight against thee, but they shall not prevail against thee: for I am with thee to save thee and to deliver thee. saith the LORD, 21 And I will deliver thee out of the hand of the wicked. and I will redeem thee out of the hand of the terrible.

EPISTLE: ROMANS 8:12-17

12 Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. 13 For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die: but if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live. 14 For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God. 15 For ye have not received the spirit of bondage again to fear; but ye have received the Spirit of adoption, whereby we cry, Abba, Father. 16 The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God: 17 And if children, then heirs; heirs of God, and joint-heirs with Christ; if so be that we suffer with him, that we may be also glorified together.


GOSPEL: MATTHEW 7:15-23

An 8 Trinity Prayer by Dr. Martin Luther

TLH # 261 LORD, KEEP US STEADFAST IN THY WORD

Martin Luther wrote this hymn, probably in 1541, and titled it, "A Children's Hymn, to be sung against the two arch-enemies of Christ and His holy Church: the Pope and the Turk". It was written to be sung by a boys' choir

at a special service for prayer against the threatening Turkish army. The second line of the first verse, "curb those who fain by craft and sword" is toned down from Luther's original, which says, "restrain the murderous Pope and Turk".

The composer of the tune, "Erhalt uns, Herr", is unknown, but it is thought that it was written by Luther himself for his above hymn. It is based on a plainsong melody.
